Subject: (i) Under the influence of Well Marked Low-Pressure Area over central parts of northern Madhya Pradesh & adjoining south Uttar Pradesh, isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall very likely over East Rajasthan, West Madhya Pradesh on 04th & 05th September and East Madhya Pradesh on 04th September, 2026.
(ii) Subdued rainfall activity likely to continue over Peninsular India during next 6-7 days.

Realised weather during past 24 hours ending at 0830 hours IST of today, the 04th September, 2026:

- ❖ **Very Heavy rainfall (12-20 cm)** has been recorded over East Madhya Pradesh.
- ❖ **Heavy rainfall (7-11 cm)** has been recorded over Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, West Uttar Pradesh, West Madhya Pradesh, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Nagaland and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal.

Weather Systems, Forecast and Warnings (Annexure I & II):

- ❖ The western end of the **monsoon trough** at mean sea level lies near its normal position and eastern end to the north of normal position.
- ❖ Yesterday's **Well Marked low pressure area** over northeast Madhya Pradesh & neighbourhood lay over central parts of northern Madhya Pradesh & adjoining south Uttar Pradesh at 0830 IST of today, the 04th September 2026. It is likely to be quasi-stationary during next 2 days.
- ❖ A **trough** runs from Northeast Rajasthan to Manipur in lower tropospheric levels.
- ❖ A **trough** runs from south Gujarat to Jharkhand in lower & middle tropospheric levels.
- ❖ A **trough** runs from South Interior Karnataka to Gulf of Munnar in lower tropospheric level.
- ❖ A fresh **Western Disturbance** lies as a trough in middle & upper tropospheric level roughly along Long. 64°E to the north of Lat. 32°N.

Under the influence of above systems, the following weather is likely:

Northwest India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad on 4th September; Himachal Pradesh during 4th-5th September; Uttarakhand during 4th-10th September.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over East Rajasthan and Haryana Chandigarh & Delhi during 4th-5th September; West Uttar Pradesh during 4th-6th September; East Uttar Pradesh during 6th-8th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over rest parts of northwest India.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad on 4th September; Himachal Pradesh during 4th-5th September; Uttarakhand during 4th-10th September; Haryana Chandigarh & Delhi, Punjab and West Uttar Pradesh during 4th-6th September; East Uttar Pradesh during 6th-8th September with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Punjab, Haryana- Chandigarh on 04th and East Rajasthan during 4th-5th September.

Central India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 4th-6th September; East Madhya Pradesh during 4th-8th September; Chhattisgarh on 4th September and during 8th-10th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 7th-10th September; East Madhya Pradesh during 9th-10th September; Vidarbha during 4th-10th September; Chhattisgarh during 5th-7th September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over West Madhya Pradesh on 6th September; East Madhya Pradesh during 5th-8th September with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 4th-5th September; East Madhya Pradesh on 4th September.

East India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 4th-10th September; Gangetic West Bengal during 4th-5th September and during 7th-10th September; Jharkhand during 8th-10th September; Bihar during 5th-6th September and on 10th September; Odisha on 10th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Gangetic West Bengal on 6th September; Jharkhand during 4th-7th September; Bihar on 4th September and during 7th-9th September; Odisha during 4th-9th September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 4th-8th September; Gangetic West Bengal on 4th September and during 8th-9th September; Jharkhand on 9th September; Bihar during 5th-8th September; Odisha during 9th-10th September.

Northeast India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 4th-8th September; Assam & Meghalaya during 4th-8th September and on 10th September; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 4th-10th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 9th-10th September; Assam & Meghalaya on 9th September.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Arunachal Pradesh, Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 4th-10th September.

West India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** likely over Konkan & Goa during 4th-10th September.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Gujarat Region, Madhya Maharashtra, Marathawada and Saurashtra & Kutch during 4th-10th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Madhya Maharashtra and Marathawada on 4th September.

South Peninsular India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, Kerala & Mahe, North Interior Karnataka, Rayalaseema, South Interior Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal and Telangana during 4th-10th September; Lakshadweep during 4th-8th September.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall accompanied with thunderstorm & lightning likely over Lakshadweep during 9th-10th September; Coastal Karnataka during 4th-10th September.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 40-50 kmph gusting to 60 kmph)** likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, Rayalaseema and Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal during 4th-5th September, **with gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over North Interior Karnataka and South Interior Karnataka during 4th-6th September; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 6th-8th September.
- ❖ Strong Surface Winds likely over North Interior Karnataka and South Interior Karnataka during 4th-6th September; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 4th-8th September.

Fishermen Warning:

- ❖ **Arabian Sea:** Along and off Somalia coast, over few parts of westcentral & southwest Arabian Sea till 09th September, along and off few parts of Oman coasts adjoining northwest during 06th to 09th September.

Weather forecast over Delhi/NCR during 04th -07th September 2026**Past Weather:**

There has been rise in maximum temperatures by 1-4°C and rise in minimum temperatures by 1°C over Delhi during the past 24 hours. The maximum temperatures were 32-35°C and the minimum temperatures are in the range 24-28°C respectively during past 24 hours over Delhi. The minimum temperatures were above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at many places and normal (-1.5 to 1.5°C) at remaining parts over Delhi. The maximum temperatures were below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at isolated places and normal (-1.5 to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speed 20 kmph from the east direction prevailed over Delhi during past 24 hours. Very light to light rain has been occurred at a few places over Delhi during the past 24 hours. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speeds up to 15 kmph likely to prevail from the southeast direction during forenoon over the region today.

Weather Forecast:

04.09.2026: Generally cloudy sky. One or two spells of light to moderate rainfall at most places with heavy rainfall at isolated places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning during afternoon to night. The maximum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 31-33°C. The maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 15 kmph during the afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 20 kmph from southeast direction during the evening and night.

05.09.2026: Generally cloudy sky. One or two spells of light to moderate rain at many places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning during early morning to forenoon. Another spell of light to moderate rain at a few places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning towards afternoon to evening. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 29°C to 31°C and 24°C to 26°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places and the maximum temperatures will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 18 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from southeast direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 18 kmph from southeast direction during evening and night.

06.09.2026: Partly cloudy sky. Possibility of very light rain. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 31°C to 33°C and 22°C to 24°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places and the maximum temperatures will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 10 kmph from during morning hours. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 12 kmph from east direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 15 kmph from southeast direction during evening and night.

07.09.2026: Partly cloudy sky. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 33°C to 35°C and 23°C to 25°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places and the maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southwest direction with wind speed reaching up to 10 kmph during the morning hours. The surface wind speed will increase becoming up to 15 kmph from the northwest direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 18 kmph from northwest direction during evening and night.

Impact Expected and Action Suggested due to very heavy rainfall:

- ❖ Isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall very likely over Punjab, Haryana- Chandigarh on 04th; East Rajasthan, West Madhya Pradesh on 04th & 05th and East Madhya Pradesh on 04th September.

Impact expected:

- ❖ Breaking of tree branches, uprooting of small trees like banana, papaya, drum sticks. Strong wind and rain may damage plantation, horticulture and standing crops.
- ❖ Partial damage to vulnerable structures due to strong winds and rain.
- ❖ Minor damage to kutcha houses/walls, huts and roads due to heavy rain.
- ❖ Loose objects may fly.
- ❖ Small ships, trawlers and boats may be affected.
- ❖ Road and rail traffic may be affected due to heavy rain and squally winds.
- ❖ There could be localised landslides, mudslides, landslips, water logging, inundation and flooding over low lying areas.
- ❖ Occasional reduction in visibility due to heavy rainfall.
- ❖ Helicopter services may get affected.

Action suggested:

- ❖ People are advised to keep a watch on the weather for worsening conditions and be ready to move to safer places accordingly.
- ❖ Take safe shelters; do not take shelter under trees, as there could be lightning.
- ❖ In case of expected lightning, unplug electrical/ electronic appliances, immediately, get out of water bodies and keep away from all the objects that conduct electricity.
- ❖ Tourism and recreational activities to be regulated.
- ❖ Onshore and offshore activities to be judiciously regulated.
- ❖ Helicopter services to be regulated.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Heavy Rainfall

- In **Madhya Pradesh**, ensure proper drainage in soybean, cotton, maize and sugarcane fields to prevent waterlogging. Avoid transplanting during wet conditions, provide support to vulnerable plants and undertake propping in tall sugarcane to minimise lodging.
- In **East Rajasthan** harvest ripe and marketable fruits of tomato, chilli and brinjal and maintain proper drainage in fields to avoid water logging. Keep harvested produce in safe and dry places.
- In **Arunachal Pradesh**, ensure continuous and effective drainage in rice, maize, finger millet, soybean, cowpea, vegetables and orchards and remove excess water promptly. Keep millet fields well drained during panicle initiation and flowering. Postpone fertilizer and plant-protection operations during rainfall
- In **Assam** and **Meghalaya**, ensure continuous and effective drainage in rice, sugarcane, soybean, pigeon pea, jute, sesame and vegetable fields and keep drainage channels clear. Postpone fertilizer and plant-protection operations during rainfall and harvest jute at the small-pod stage wherever field conditions permit.
- In **Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram** and **Tripura**, maintain proper drainage in rice, soybean, black gram, ginger, turmeric, cole crops and vegetable fields to prevent water stagnation. Harvest mature maize, colocasia and ginger wherever field conditions permit and avoid field operations during excessively wet conditions. Keep harvested produce in safe and dry places.
- In **Sub-Himalayan West Bengal** and **Sikkim**, keep drainage channels clear in rice, vegetable fields, orchards and nursery beds to prevent waterlogging. Protect vegetable seedlings from heavy rain, improve drainage around cucurbits and avoid nitrogen application during wet conditions.
- In **Uttarakhand**, maintain effective drainage in sugarcane, soybean, kidney bean, green gram, black gram, other standing crops and vegetable fields. Keep drainage channels clear and provide support to tall crops and vegetables to prevent lodging.
- In **Bihar**, maintain proper drainage in rice, maize, sesame, pigeon pea and other standing crop fields and avoid prolonged water stagnation. Postpone field operations, fertilizer and plant-protection applications in excessively wet fields until suitable conditions prevail.
- In **Uttar Pradesh**, ensure proper drainage of excess rainwater from standing crop fields, particularly low-lying areas prone to waterlogging. Postpone irrigation, fertilizer application and plant-protection operations in saturated.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Thunderstorm / Gusty Winds

- Shift the harvested produce in safer places or cover the produce with tarpaulin sheets in the fields. Tie the harvested crops securely and cover them to minimize the risk of displacement from strong surface winds.
- Provide mechanical support to horticultural crops and staking or support to vegetables and young fruit plants / fruit-bearing plants to avoid lodging due to strong winds.

Livestock / Poultry / Fisheries

- Keep the animals inside the shed during heavy rainfall and provide them balanced feed.
- Store the feed and fodder in a safe place to prevent spoilage.
- Construct an outlet with proper netting around the ponds to drain excess water, thereby preventing fish from escaping in the event of overflow.

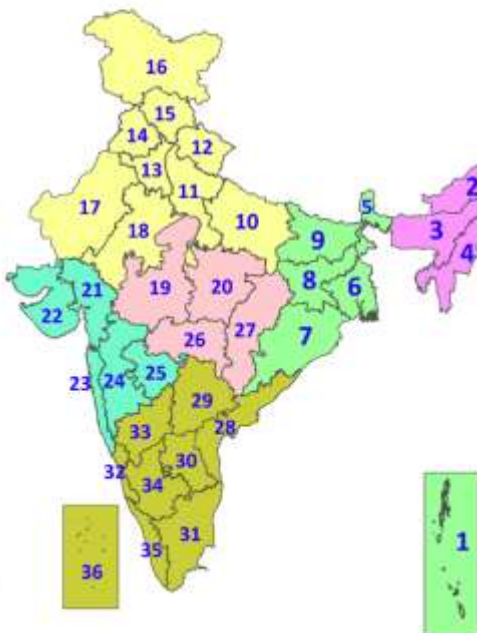
