Subject: (i) Isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall very likely over East & Northeast India during next 5-6 days with Isolated extremely heavy rainfall likely over Meghalaya on today, the 5th August, 2026.

(ii) Isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall also likely over Kerala & Karnataka during next 4 days.

Realised weather during past 24 hours ending at 0830 hours IST of today, the 05th August, 2026:

- ❖ **Extremely heavy rainfall (≥ 21 cm)** has been recorded over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim
- ❖ **Very Heavy rainfall (12-20 cm)** has been recorded over Uttarakhand, Himachal Pradesh, Haryana Chandigarh & Delhi, West Uttar Pradesh, West Madhya Pradesh, Madhya Maharashtra, South Interior Karnataka, Meghalaya
- ❖ **Heavy rainfall (7-11 cm)** has been recorded over Gangetic West Bengal, Odisha, Jammu-Kashmir, East Uttar Pradesh, East Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Goa, Kerala, Coastal Karnataka, Coastal Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Arunachal Pradesh, Nagaland

Weather Systems, Forecast and Warnings (Annexure I & II):

- ❖ The **Monsoon trough** lies north of its normal position at mean sea level.
- ❖ The **Western Disturbance** as a trough in middle & upper tropospheric westerlies with its axis at 5.8km above mean sea level roughly along Long. 71°E to the north of Lat. 31°N.
- ❖ A **cyclonic circulation** lay over northwest Uttar Pradesh & neighbourhood in lower tropospheric level.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over south Tamil Nadu- Puducherry in middle tropospheric levels.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over southwest Uttar Pradesh & neighbourhood in middle and upper tropospheric levels.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over northeast Bihar & adjoining Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim between lower and upper tropospheric levels.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over central Assam between lower and middle tropospheric levels.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lay over Northeast Bangladesh & neighbourhood in lower tropospheric level.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over South Interior Karnataka & neighbourhood in middle tropospheric level.

Under the influence of above systems, the following weather is likely:

Northwest India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Himachal Pradesh, Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad and Uttarakhand during 5th-11th August.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over East Uttar Pradesh, Haryana Chandigarh & Delhi and West Uttar Pradesh during 5th-6th August; West Rajasthan during 8th-9th August; East Rajasthan during 7th-8th August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over plains of northwest India.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Uttarakhand during 5th-11th August; West Rajasthan on 6th August; East Rajasthan during 5th-6th August and during 9th-10th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad on 5th August and during 8th-11th August; Himachal Pradesh during 5th-11th August; Uttarakhand during 7th-11th August; Haryana Chandigarh & Delhi during 5th-6th August; West Uttar Pradesh during 6th-7th August; East Uttar Pradesh on 6th August; West Rajasthan during 7th-9th August; East Rajasthan on 6th August and during 9th-10th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Uttarakhand during 5th-6th August; East Uttar Pradesh and West Uttar Pradesh on 5th August; East Rajasthan during 7th-8th August.

Central India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 5th-6th August and during 10th-11th August; Chhattisgarh and East Madhya Pradesh during 9th-11th August; Vidarbha during 6th-11th August.

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 7th-9th August; Chhattisgarh and East Madhya Pradesh during 5th-8th August; Vidarbha on 5th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Chhattisgarh during 5th-9th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 5th-6th August and on 8th August; Chhattisgarh and East Madhya Pradesh during 5th-7th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over West Madhya Pradesh on 7th August.

East India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Gangetic West Bengal, Odisha and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 5th-11th August; Jharkhand during 5th-8th August and during 10th-11th August; Bihar during 5th-7th August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Jharkhand on 9th August; Bihar during 8th-11th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands during 5th-8th August; Bihar and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 6th-8th August; Gangetic West Bengal on 5th August and during 7th-8th August; Jharkhand during 5th-9th August; Odisha during 7th-8th August and during 10th-11th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Bihar and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim on 5th August; Gangetic West Bengal on 6th August; Odisha during 5th-6th August and on 9th August.
- ❖ **Thundersquall (wind speed reaching 50-60 kmph gusting to 70 kmph)** likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands during 5th-10th August.

Northeast India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 5th-10th August; Assam & Meghalaya during 9th-10th August.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh on 11th August; Assam & Meghalaya during 5th-8th August and on 11th August; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 5th-11th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 5th-6th August; Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 5th-9th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Arunachal Pradesh on 5th August, on 7th August and during 10th-11th August; Assam & Meghalaya during 5th-11th August; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 6th-11th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura on 5th August.
- ❖ **Heavy to very heavy rainfall with extremely heavy rainfall likely at isolated places over Meghalaya on 05th August.**

West India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Konkan & Goa during 5th-11th August; Madhya Maharashtra on 5th August; Gujarat Region during 8th-10th August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Madhya Maharashtra during 6th-11th August; Marathawada and Saurashtra & Kutch during 5th-11th August; Gujarat Region during 5th-7th August and on 11th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Madhya Maharashtra during 8th-9th August; Marathawada during 7th-9th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Konkan & Goa on 5th August and on 7th August; Madhya Maharashtra on 7th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Konkan & Goa on 6th August; Madhya Maharashtra during 5th-6th August.

South Peninsular India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, North Interior Karnataka, Rayalaseema, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal and Telangana during 5th-11th August; South Interior Karnataka during 9th-11th August.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Coastal Karnataka, Kerala & Mahe and Lakshadweep during 5th-11th August; South Interior Karnataka during 5th-8th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 40-50 kmph gusting to 60 kmph)** likely over Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal during 5th-7th August; Kerala & Mahe, Lakshadweep and South Interior Karnataka during 5th-8th August; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 5th-9th August, **with gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over Coastal Karnataka and Telangana during 5th-7th August; North Interior Karnataka during 5th-8th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal during 6th-8th August; Kerala & Mahe on 5th August and on 8th August; Coastal Karnataka and South Interior Karnataka during 5th-8th August; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam during 8th-10th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Kerala & Mahe during 6th-7th August.
- ❖ Strong Surface Winds likely over Kerala & Mahe, Lakshadweep, North Interior Karnataka and South Interior Karnataka during 5th-8th August; Coastal Karnataka and Telangana during 5th-7th August; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 5th-9th August.

Fishermen Warning:

- ❖ **Arabian Sea:** Along and off Somalia, Oman coasts, over most parts of westcentral adjoining some parts of southwest and few parts north Arabian Sea till 10th August, few parts of eastcentral Arabian sea on 05th and 09th August, and some parts of eastcentral Arabian sea during 06th to 09th August; along and off Karnataka, Kerala coasts, Lakshadweep Area adjoining sea areas and few parts of Comorian areas during 05th to 09th August.
- ❖ **Bay of Bengal:** Over Andaman Sea and south Sri Lanka Coast during 05th to 10th August adjoining many parts of south Bay of Bengal during 05th to 07th August, some parts of south Bay of Bengal during 07th to 09th August and few parts south Bay of Bengal on 09th August.

Weather forecast over Delhi/NCR during 05th to 08th August 2026**Past Weather:**

There has been fall in maximum temperatures by 2-3°C and no large change in minimum temperatures over Delhi during past 24 hours. The maximum temperatures were in the range of 31-33°C and the minimum temperatures are in the range 24-27°C respectively during past 24 hours over Delhi. The minimum temperatures are below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at a few places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. The maximum temperatures were appreciably below normal (-3.1°C to -5.0°C) at isolated places, below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at a few places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. Very light to light rain has been occurred at many places with moderate rain at a few places over Delhi during past 24 hours. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speed 20 kmph from the southwest direction prevailed over Delhi during past 24 hours. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speeds up to 18 kmph likely to prevail from the southwest direction over the region in the forenoon today.

Weather Forecast:

05.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. One or two spells of light to moderate rain at many places with heavy rain at isolated places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning during afternoon to evening. Another spell of very light to light rain at many places accompanied with Thunderstorm/lightning towards night. The maximum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 32-34°C. The maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at many places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the northwest direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 20 kmph during the afternoon hours. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 25 kmph from the southwest direction during evening and night.

06.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. One or two spells of very light to light rain at many places with moderate rain at a few places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning during early morning to noon. Another spell of very light to light rain at many places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning towards evening/night. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 31°C to 33°C and 22°C to 24°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from west direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 20 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the southwest direction during the afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 02 kmph from the southeast direction during evening and night.

07.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. One or two spells of very light to light rain at many places with moderate rain at a few places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning during early morning to noon. Another spell of very light to light rain at many places accompanied with thunderstorm/lightning towards evening/night. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 32°C to 34°C and 22°C to 24°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 15 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 18 kmph from the north direction during the afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 12 kmph from the east direction during evening and night.

08.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. A spell of very light to light rain at a few places during early morning to noon. Another spell of very light to light rain at many places in the evening/night. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 33°C to 35°C and 23°C to 25°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southeast direction with wind reaching up to 10 kmph during the morning hours. The surface wind speed will increase becoming up to 12 kmph from the northwest direction during the afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 15 kmph from the northeast direction during evening and night.

Impact Expected and Action Suggested due to very heavy rainfall:

- ❖ **Heavy to very heavy rainfall with extremely heavy rainfall likely at isolated places over Meghalaya on 05th August.**

Impact expected:

- ❖ Breaking of tree branches, uprooting of small trees like banana, papaya, drum sticks. Strong wind and rain may damage plantation, horticulture and standing crops.
- ❖ Partial damage to vulnerable structures due to strong winds and rain.
- ❖ Minor damage to kutcha houses/walls, huts and roads due to heavy rain.
- ❖ Loose objects may fly.
- ❖ Small ships, trawlers and boats may be affected.
- ❖ Road and rail traffic may be affected due to heavy rain and squally winds.
- ❖ There could be localised landslides, mudslides, landslips, water logging, inundation and flooding over low lying areas.
- ❖ Occasional reduction in visibility due to heavy rainfall.
- ❖ Helicopter services may get affected.

Action suggested:

- ❖ People are advised to keep a watch on the weather for worsening conditions and be ready to move to safer places accordingly.
- ❖ Take safe shelters; do not take shelter under trees, as there could be lightning.
- ❖ In case of expected lightning, unplug electrical/ electronic appliances, immediately, get out of water bodies and keep away from all the objects that conduct electricity.
- ❖ Tourism and recreational activities to be regulated.
- ❖ Onshore and offshore activities to be judiciously regulated.
- ❖ Helicopter services to be regulated.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Heavy Rainfall

- ❖ In **Arunachal Pradesh**, ensure proper drainage in rice, maize, soybean and finger millet fields, orchards and low-lying areas to prevent prolonged waterlogging. Harvest all mature cucumbers, bottle gourds and other cucurbits immediately and store in safe place. Secure vines firmly to bamboo stakes or trellises to prevent lodging.
- ❖ In **Assam**, keep field drainage channels clear and maintain proper drainage in rice nurseries, jute, sugarcane, soybean, pigeon pea, sesame and vegetable fields to prevent prolonged waterlogging. Provide staking or support to banana, vegetables and other vulnerable crops against strong winds.
- ❖ In **Meghalaya**, ensure proper drainage from rice nurseries and fields of maize, cowpea, okra and ginger to prevent prolonged waterlogging. Strengthen nursery bunds and keep drainage channels free from obstruction.
- ❖ In **Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram and Tripura**, ensure proper drainage from soybean, black gram, ginger, turmeric, cole crop and vegetable fields to prevent residual waterlogging.
- ❖ In **West Bengal**, maintain proper drainage in rice nurseries and fields of rice, ginger, tomato, chilli, Dalley Khorsani, finger millet and fruit orchards to prevent waterlogging. Strengthen terrace bunds in transplanted rice fields. Protect chilli seedlings from heavy rain.
- ❖ In **Bihar**, make proper arrangements for drainage of excess rainwater from crop fields and postpone the application of fertilizers and pesticides.
- ❖ In **Odisha**, maintain effective drainage from nursery beds, fields of *kharif* crops such as maize, pulses (green gram, black gram, pigeon pea etc.), oilseeds (groundnut, sesame etc.), cotton, vegetables and fruit orchards to prevent waterlogging.
- ❖ In **Konkan**, ensure proper drainage in turmeric, groundnut, transplanted rice and finger millet, porso millet, vegetable fields and orchards. Remove excess rainwater from low-lying areas to prevent prolonged waterlogging.
- ❖ In *ghat* areas of **Madhya Maharashtra**, drain out excess water from rice nurseries and *kharif* crops like maize, cotton, pigeon pea, groundnut, green gram and black gram.
- ❖ In **Keralam**, drain out excess rain water from plantations of banana, coconut, cardamom, ginger, black pepper and fields of turmeric and vegetables to prevent waterlogging. Provide strong support for banana plants and trellis-grown crops.
- ❖ In **Coastal and South Interior Karnataka**, keep field drainage channels clear and drain out excess rain water from fields of paddy, maize, millets and vegetables; plantations of arecanut and fruit orchards to prevent prolonged waterlogging.

- ❖ In **Jammu and Kashmir**, undertake harvesting of mature cobs of early-sown maize crop. Maintain proper drainage in fields of maize, green gram, black gram and vegetables to prevent waterlogging. Postpone irrigation in transplanted rice.
- ❖ In **Himachal Pradesh**, carry out picking of pea pods and harvesting of vegetables (tomato, capsicum, brinjal *etc.*) and keep the harvested produce in safe place. Maintain proper drainage in rice, maize, finger millet, tomato, brinjal, capsicum, chilli and cucumber fields and apple and pear orchards for quick removal of excess rainwater.
- ❖ In **Uttarakhand**, maintain effective drainage in rice, sugarcane, black gram, green gram, soybean, maize, groundnut, sesame, barnyard millet, finger millet, tomato and chilli fields to prevent prolonged waterlogging. Harvest mature tomato, French bean and potato wherever field conditions permit.
- ❖ In **Haryana**, ensure proper field drainage in standing crop fields to prevent waterlogging and promptly remove excess rainwater from crop fields and orchards.
- ❖ In **Uttar Pradesh**, maintain proper drainage to drain out excess rainwater from pigeon pea, other standing crop and vegetable fields, particularly from low-lying areas prone to waterlogging.
- ❖ In **East Rajasthan**, make necessary arrangements for drainage from the fields of already sown pearl millet, green gram, sesame, moth bean, cluster bean, other standing crops and vegetables.

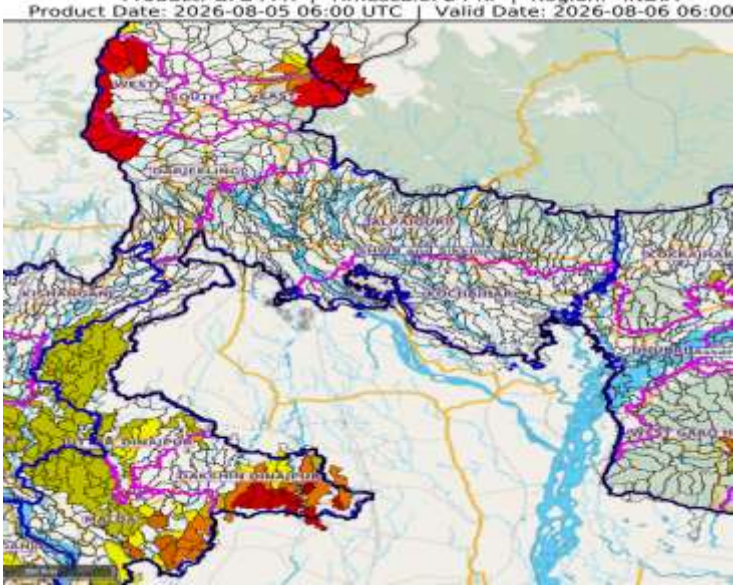
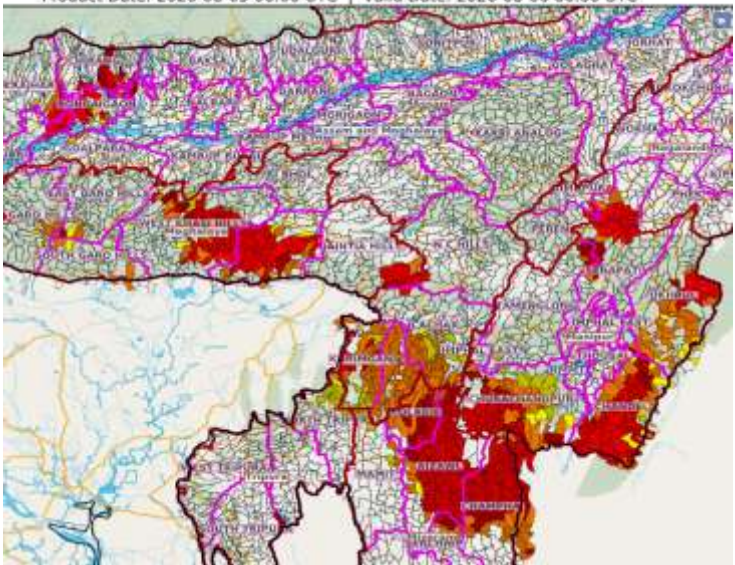
Agromet advisories for likely impact of Thunderstorm / Gusty Winds

- ❖ Shift the harvested produce in safer places or cover the produce with tarpaulin sheets in the fields. Tie the harvested crops securely and cover them to minimize the risk of displacement from strong surface winds.
- ❖ Provide mechanical support to horticultural crops and staking or support to vegetables and young fruit plants / fruit-bearing plants to avoid lodging due to strong winds.

Livestock / Poultry / Fisheries

- Keep the animals inside the shed during heavy rainfall and provide them balanced feed.
- Store the feed and fodder in a safe place to prevent spoilage.
- Construct an outlet with proper netting around the ponds to drain excess water, thereby preventing fish from escaping in the event of overflow.

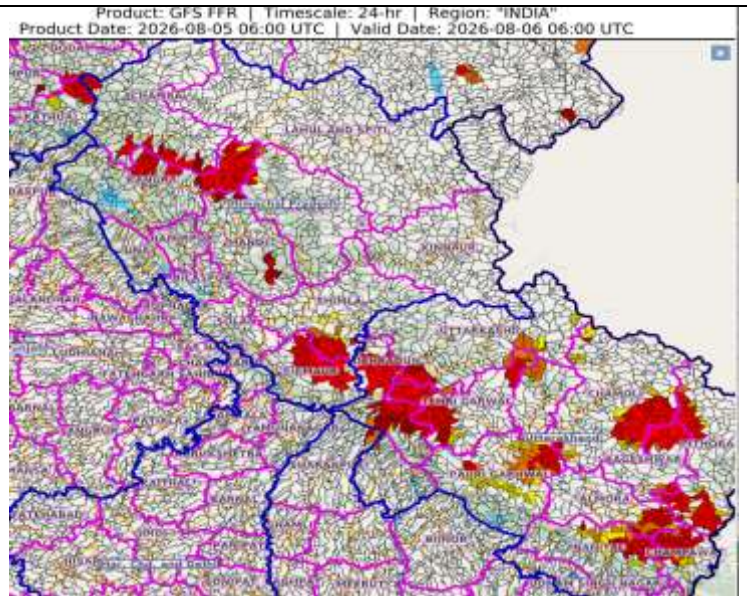

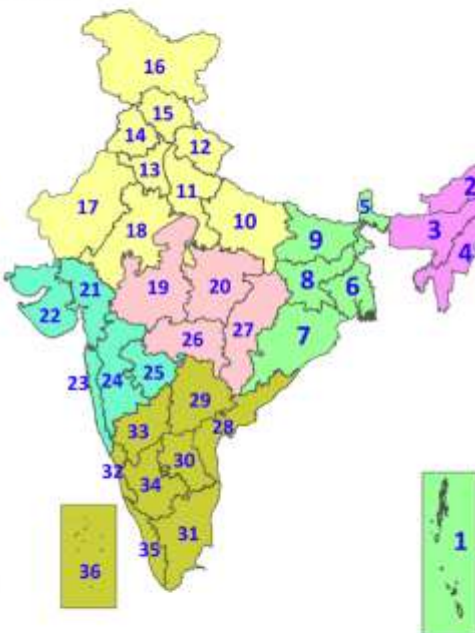

Thunderstorm

Sudden electrical discharges manifested by a flash of light (Lightning) and a sharp rumbling sound (thunder)

Dust/Sand Storm

An ensemble of particles of dust or sand energetically lifted to great heights by a strong and turbulent wind.

Frost

Ice deposits on ground
Air temperature $\leq 4^{\circ}\text{C}$ (over Plains)

Squall

A strong wind that rises suddenly, lasts for atleast 1 minute.
Moderate: Wind speed 52-61 kmph
Severe: Wind speed 62-87 kmph
Very Severe: Wind speed > 87 kmph

Sea State

Effect of various waves in the sea over specific area
Rough to very rough: Wind speed 41-62 kmph (22-33 knots) & Wave height 2.5-6 metre
High to very high: Wind speed 63-117 kmph (34-63 knots) & Wave height 6-14 metre
Phenomenal: Wind speed > 117 kmph (> 63 knots) & Wave height > 14 metre

Cyclone
