Subject: (i) Under the influence of Low-Pressure Area over Jharkhand & neighbourhood, isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall likely over East Uttar Pradesh, East Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh on today, 25th August. Isolated heavy rainfall also likely over Bihar and Uttar Pradesh during next 3 days.
(ii) Subdued rainfall activity likely to continue over Peninsular India during next one week.

Realised weather during past 24 hours ending at 0830 hours IST of today, the 25th August, 2026:

- ❖ **Very Heavy rainfall (12-20 cm)** has been recorded over East Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Meghalaya, South Interior Karnataka and Kerala.
- ❖ **Heavy rainfall (7-11 cm)** has been recorded over Delhi, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, East Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Tamil Nadu and Coastal Karnataka.

Weather Systems, Forecast and Warnings (Annexure I & II):

- ❖ The western end of **monsoon trough** is north of its normal position and eastern end is near its normal position in lower & middle tropospheric levels.
- ❖ Yesterday's **Low-Pressure Area** over Gangetic West Bengal & adjoining areas of Jharkhand and North Odisha lay over Jharkhand & neighbourhood at 0830 Hrs IST of today, the 25th August 2026. The system is likely to move nearly west-northwestwards during the next 24 hours.
- ❖ An **upper air cyclonic circulation** lies over Northeast Assam & neighbourhood in lower tropospheric levels.

Under the influence of above systems, the following weather is likely:

Northwest India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Uttarakhand during 25th-31st August.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over West Uttar Pradesh on 25th August; East Uttar Pradesh during 25th-27th August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Himachal Pradesh and Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 25th-31st August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over rest parts of northwest India.
- ❖ **Isolated thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Jammu-Kashmir-Ladakh-Gilgit-Baltistan-Muzaffarabad during 28th-31st August; Uttarakhand during 25th-31st August; East Rajasthan on 27th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Uttarakhand during 25th-26th August and during 30th-31st August; East Rajasthan and West Uttar Pradesh during 25th-26th August; East Uttar Pradesh during 26th-27th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over East Uttar Pradesh on 25th August.

Central India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 25th-26th August; East Madhya Pradesh during 25th-29th August; Vidarbha during 25th-28th August; Chhattisgarh during 25th-31st August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 27th-31st August; East Madhya Pradesh during 30th-31st August; Vidarbha during 29th-31st August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Chhattisgarh, East Madhya Pradesh and West Madhya Pradesh during 25th-29th August; Vidarbha on 25th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over West Madhya Pradesh during 25th-27th August; Chhattisgarh and East Madhya Pradesh during 26th-29th August; Vidarbha on 25th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Chhattisgarh and East Madhya Pradesh on 25th August.

East India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Gangetic West Bengal, Jharkhand and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 25th-31st August; Bihar on 26th August; Odisha on 25th August and during 28th-31st August.

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Bihar on 25th August and during 27th-31st August; Odisha during 26th-27th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Gangetic West Bengal, Jharkhand and Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 25th-29th August; Bihar during 25th-31st August; Odisha during 27th-29th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal & Sikkim during 25th-28th August; Gangetic West Bengal during 28th-30th August; Jharkhand during 25th-29th August; Bihar during 25th-27th August; Odisha on 25th August, on 27th August and on 31st August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Odisha during 28th-30th August.

Northeast India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 25th-26th August and during 30th-31st August; Assam & Meghalaya on 25th August and during 28th-31st August; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 25th-31st August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 27th-29th August; Assam & Meghalaya during 26th-27th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Arunachal Pradesh during 25th-27th August; Assam & Meghalaya and Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 25th-29th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Arunachal Pradesh and Assam & Meghalaya during 25th-31st August; Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura on 25th August, during 27th-28th August and on 31st August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram & Tripura during 29th-30th August.

West India:

- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Konkan & Goa during 25th-31st August; Madhya Maharashtra and Marathawada on 25th August.
- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Madhya Maharashtra and Marathawada during 26th-31st August; Gujarat Region and Saurashtra & Kutch during 25th-31st August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Marathawada on 25th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Madhya Maharashtra during 25th-26th August.

South Peninsular India:

- ❖ **Isolated to Scattered** rainfall likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam, North Interior Karnataka, Rayalaseema, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal and Telangana during 25th-31st August; Kerala & Mahe and Lakshadweep during 29th-31st August; South Interior Karnataka during 26th-31st August.
- ❖ **Fairly Widespread to Widespread** rainfall likely over Kerala & Mahe and Lakshadweep during 25th-28th August; Coastal Karnataka during 25th-31st August; South Interior Karnataka on 25th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm, lightning & gusty winds (speed reaching 40-50 kmph gusting to 60 kmph)** likely over Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal during 25th-26th August; Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 25th-29th August, **with gusty winds (speed reaching 30-40 kmph gusting to 50 kmph)** likely over Kerala & Mahe and Lakshadweep during 25th-26th August; Telangana on 25th August.
- ❖ Isolated **thunderstorm & lightning** likely over Coastal Karnataka, North Interior Karnataka and South Interior Karnataka on 25th August.
- ❖ Isolated **heavy rainfall** likely over Coastal Karnataka, South Interior Karnataka and Tamil Nadu, Puducherry & Karaikal on 25th August; Kerala & Mahe during 25th-26th August with isolated **very heavy rainfall** also likely over Kerala on 25th August.
- ❖ Strong Surface Winds likely over Coastal Andhra Pradesh & Yanam and Rayalaseema during 25th-29th August.

Fishermen Warning:

- ❖ **Arabian Sea:** Along and off Somalia, Oman coasts, some parts of westcentral Arabian Sea and some parts of southwest Arabian Sea till 30th August, over few parts of eastcentral & north Arabian Sea during 27th to 29th August; Along and off Karnataka, Kerala, and Lakshadweep area till 27th August.
- ❖ **Bay of Bengal:** Over some parts of Gulf of Mannar adjoining Comorin area, some parts of southwest adjoining Sri Lanka coasts. and over Andaman Sea till 30th August; Off North Andhra Pradesh coasts adjoining some parts of westcentral & eastcentral Bay of Bengal on 25th August; over some parts of southeast adjoining eastcentral Bay of Bengal on 26th August, some parts of central adjoining southeast Bay of Bengal during 28th to 30th August.

Weather forecast over Delhi/NCR during 25th to 28th August 2026**Past Weather:**

There has been fall in maximum temperatures by 1-3°C and fall in minimum temperatures by 3-4° over Delhi during past 24 hours. The maximum temperatures were 31-33°C and the minimum temperatures are in the range 21-24°C respectively during past 24 hours over Delhi. The minimum temperatures are appreciably below normal (-3.1°C to -5.0°C) at a few places, below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at a few places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. The maximum temperatures were appreciably below normal (-3.1°C to -5.0°C) at isolated places, below normal (-1.6°C to -3.0°C) at many places and normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at remaining parts of Delhi. Heavy rain has been occurred at many places with moderate rain at a few places accompanied with Thunderstorm/Lightning over Delhi during the past 24 hours. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speed 20 kmph gusting to 54 kmph from the west direction prevailed over Delhi during past 24 hours. Generally cloudy sky with surface wind speeds up to 16 kmph likely to prevail from the southeast direction during forenoon over the region today.

Weather Forecast:

25.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. A spell of very light to light rain at many places with moderate rain at isolated places during evening to night. The maximum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 32-34°C. The maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 18 kmph during the afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the southeast direction during evening and night.

26.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. Possibility of very light to light rain at a few places during morning to noon. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 32°C to 34°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the southeast direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 15 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 12 kmph from the southeast direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 15 kmph from the southeast direction during evening and night.

27.08.2026: Generally cloudy sky. Possibility of very light rain towards afternoon. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 34°C to 36°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from northwest direction with surface wind speed reaching up to 25 kmph during the morning hours. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 15 kmph from the northwest direction during afternoon. The wind speed will increase becoming up to 18 kmph from the west direction during evening and night.

28.08.2026: Partly cloudy sky. The maximum and minimum temperatures over Delhi are likely to be in the range of 35°C to 37°C and 25°C to 27°C, respectively. The minimum temperature will be near normal (-1.5°C to 1.5°C) at most places, and the maximum temperatures will be above normal (1.6°C to 3.0°C) at most places over Delhi. The predominant surface wind is likely to be from the northwest direction with wind reaching up to 20 kmph during the morning hours. The surface wind speed will increase becoming up to 22 kmph from the northwest direction during afternoon. The wind speed will decrease becoming up to 20 kmph from the west direction during evening and night.

Impact Expected and Action Suggested due to very heavy rainfall:

- ❖ Isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall likely over East Uttar Pradesh, East Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh on 25th August.

Impact expected:

- ❖ Breaking of tree branches, uprooting of small trees like banana, papaya, drum sticks. Strong wind and rain may damage plantation, horticulture and standing crops.
- ❖ Partial damage to vulnerable structures due to strong winds and rain.
- ❖ Minor damage to kutcha houses/walls, huts and roads due to heavy rain.
- ❖ Loose objects may fly.
- ❖ Small ships, trawlers and boats may be affected.
- ❖ Road and rail traffic may be affected due to heavy rain and squally winds.
- ❖ There could be localised landslides, mudslides, landslips, water logging, inundation and flooding over low lying areas.
- ❖ Occasional reduction in visibility due to heavy rainfall.
- ❖ Helicopter services may get affected.

Action suggested:

- ❖ People are advised to keep a watch on the weather for worsening conditions and be ready to move to safer places accordingly.
- ❖ Take safe shelters; do not take shelter under trees, as there could be lightning.
- ❖ In case of expected lightning, unplug electrical/ electronic appliances, immediately, get out of water bodies and keep away from all the objects that conduct electricity.
- ❖ Tourism and recreational activities to be regulated.
- ❖ Onshore and offshore activities to be judiciously regulated.
- ❖ Helicopter services to be regulated.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Heavy Rainfall

- In **Madhya Pradesh**, maintain effective drainage in maize, soybean, sugarcane, cotton, vegetable, pulse and oilseed fields and promptly remove excess water. Postpone fertilizer application and intercultural operations until the soil becomes workable. Provide staking/support to young vegetable plants and propping to sugarcane to minimize lodging.
- In **Chhattisgarh**, ensure continuous and effective drainage in rice, maize, groundnut, minor millets, pulses and vegetable fields to prevent water stagnation. Clean drainage channels in low-lying maize, ginger, turmeric and vegetable fields and provide staking/support to cucurbits, tomato and capsicum.
- In **Vidarbha**, maintain proper drainage in soybean, cotton, maize and other standing crop fields and remove excess rainwater promptly. Postpone fertilizer, plant protection and intercultural operations until the soil becomes workable and provide support to young vegetables and other vulnerable crops against lodging.
- In **Uttarakhand**, ensure proper drainage of excess rainwater from rice, sugarcane, maize, barnyard millet, kidney bean, finger millet, ginger and tomato fields. Clear terrace outlets and strengthen bunds to reduce erosion, waterlogging and lodging, and secure stakes and trellises in tomato and other vegetables.
- In **Uttar Pradesh**, maintain proper drainage to remove excess rainwater from pigeon pea, maize, groundnut, sesame, rice, vegetable and other standing crop fields, particularly from low-lying areas prone to waterlogging.
- In **East Rajasthan**, make arrangements for drainage from the fields of already sown pearl millet, green gram, sesame, moth bean, cluster bean, other standing crops and vegetables.
- In **Arunachal Pradesh**, maintain proper drainage in rice, maize, finger millet, soybean, cowpea, vegetable fields and orchards to remove excess water and prevent waterlogging. Keep millet fields well-drained during panicle initiation and flowering stages and maintain proper spacing and field sanitation.
- In **Assam and Meghalaya**, maintain proper drainage in rice, sugarcane, pigeon pea, green gram, sesame, jute and vegetable fields and keep field channels clear. Harvest jute at the appropriate stage wherever field conditions permit and postpone fertilizer and plant protection operations during rainfall. In Meghalaya, remove excess water from maize, cowpea, okra and ginger fields and maintain rice bunds properly.
- In **Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram and Tripura**, maintain proper drainage in rice, soybean, black gram, ginger, turmeric, cole crops, vegetables and groundnut fields to prevent water stagnation. Harvest mature maize cobs and ginger wherever field conditions permit and postpone plant protection operations until a suitable rain-free period.
- In **Odisha**, ensure continuous and effective drainage of excess water from kharif rice, maize, pulses, cotton, red gram, banana, vegetable fields and nursery beds. Keep field drains, outlets and bunds clear and functional. In

waterlogged areas, postpone sowing/re-sowing of maize and green gram and prevent water stagnation in pearl millet. Protect vegetable nurseries with polythene sheets and Provide staking to vegetables, propping to banana, papaya and young horticultural plants. Maintain emergency outlets in transplanted rice fields to prevent prolonged submergence of seedlings.

- In **Sub-Himalayan West Bengal** and **Sikkim**, clear drainage channels in vegetable fields, orchards, rice and finger millet nurseries to prevent waterlogging. Maintain proper drainage in rice and vegetable fields, protect chilli seedlings from heavy rain and support okra and bitter gourd plants against lodging and water stagnation.
- In **Bihar**, make proper arrangements for drainage of excess rainwater from crop fields and postpone the application of fertilizers and pesticides.
- In **Jharkhand**, maintain proper drainage and prevent waterlogging in all standing crops, particularly maize and red gram. Keep harvested produce in safe, dry places and protect vegetable seedlings. Postpone fertilizer and plant protection operations until rainfall subsides and field conditions become suitable.
- In **Madhya Maharashtra**, in *Ghat* areas, drain out excess rainwater from rice, finger millet and vegetable fields. Postpone intercultural operations, fertilizer application and plant protection measures until field conditions become suitable.
- In **Tamil Nadu**, provide proper drainage to rice nurseries and standing rice fields and continue rice transplanting only where field conditions permit. Postpone irrigation, fertilizer and plant protection operations during wet conditions and provide support to vulnerable young plants and vegetables.
- In **Coastal and South interior Karnataka**, ensure proper drainage in maize and ginger fields and remove excess water promptly. In coastal areas, provide drainage to black pepper, arecanut and coconut plantations and provide support to banana, papaya and young plants; undertake paddy transplanting only where suitable field conditions permit.
- In **Keralam**, ensure drainage around paddy, nutmeg, coconut and other plantation crops and promptly remove excess water from areas prone to waterlogging. Maintain good drainage around palms and ginger fields and avoid excessive nitrogen application in paddy during wet conditions.

Agromet advisories for likely impact of Thunderstorm / Gusty Winds

- Shift the harvested produce in safer places or cover the produce with tarpaulin sheets in the fields. Tie the harvested crops securely and cover them to minimize the risk of displacement from strong surface winds.
- Provide mechanical support to horticultural crops and staking or support to vegetables and young fruit plants / fruit-bearing plants to avoid lodging due to strong winds.

Livestock / Poultry / Fisheries

- ❖ Keep the animals inside the shed during heavy rainfall and provide them balanced feed.
- ❖ Store the feed and fodder in a safe place to prevent spoilage.
- ❖ Construct an outlet with proper netting around the ponds to drain excess water, thereby preventing fish from escaping in the event of overflow.

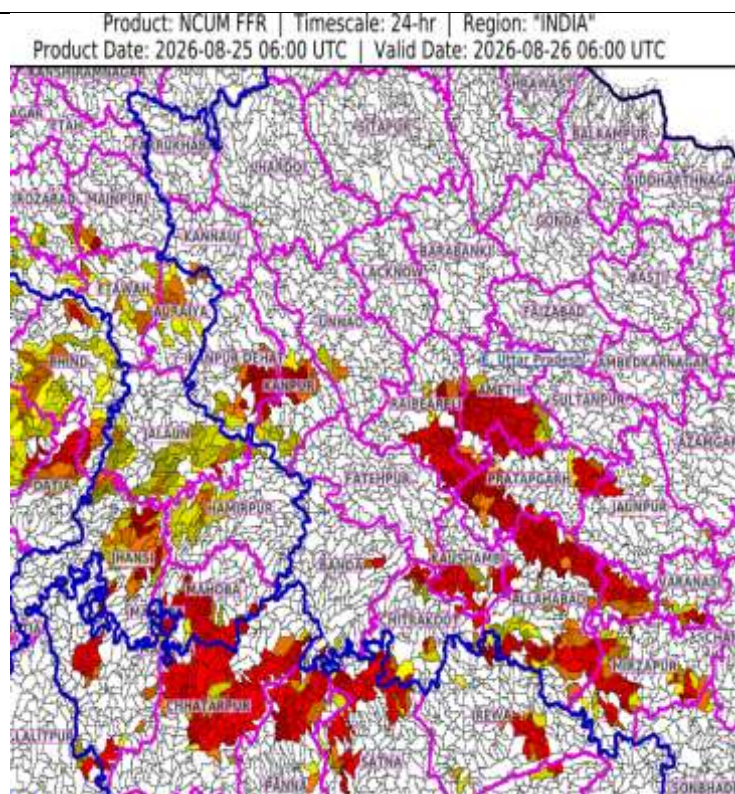
Flash Flood Guidance:

Flash Flood Risk (FFR) till 1130 IST of 26-08-2026:

Low to Moderate flash flood risk likely over few watersheds & neighbourhoods of following Met Sub-divisions during next 24 hours.

East Madhya Pradesh: Rewa, Satna, Chhatarpur, Tikamgarh and Panna districts
West Madhya Pradesh: Bhind and Datia districts

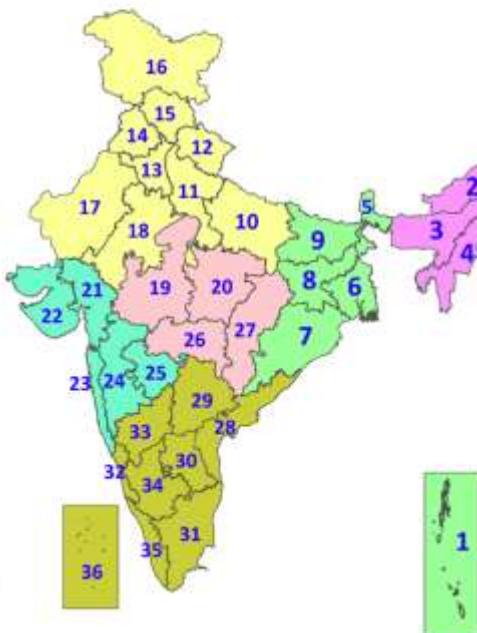
